Restoring our Heritage

Community Raises funds for Pioneer Cemetery project

A group called "Friends of the Pioneer Cemetery" has been formed to help preserve an important part of our region's heritage. The Pioneer Cemetery on Stewart Street, New Glasgow dates back to the late 1700s it is the final resting place for several of the passengers of the Ship Hector, which brought the first major emigration of settlers directly from Scotland to Nova Scotia as well as many founding families and pioneers of New Glasgow This cemetery has slowly deteriorated over the years, with many stones collapsed and many inscriptions no longer able to be read. Grass has grown over some grave stones and some are leaning and about to fall. The first phase of the restoration project will be to refurbish and restore the grave stones and Arsenault Monuments has been commissioned to complete this work.

Groups such as the Riverside Cemetery Company, the Pictou County Historical Society and the Pictou County Roots Society have already come forward with contributions, in kind and/or monetary. To date nearly \$7000 has been raised, including major donations from two descendants.

If you are a descendant or a person with an interest in preserving this valuable part of our history we would greatly appreciate your support. A charitable tax receipt will be issued for any contribution over \$10.

Mayor's Message



Dear Citizens:

I have had the pleasure during the past two years to serve on the Union of Nova Scotia Municipalities (UNSM) Task Force on Small Towns with municipal colleagues from across the province as well as municipal and provincial professional staff. I am very pleased to report that an interim copy of the report is now available on the UNSM web site (www.unsm.ca)

We met regularly throughout both 2011 and 2012 and recommendations were presented at five regional UNSM meetings. While some of the recommendations focus on towns, particularly downtowns, the bulk of them apply to all municipalities in the Province. The Task Force also recognizes that the recommendations contained in this report to ensure that our municipalities are viable in the long term, are not the end of the work. They are the start of a process to make Nova Scotia municipalities as strong as they can be.

Our mandate was to look at issues facing towns and work cooperatively with all municipalities in the UNSM to find recommendations that will have a positive impact on the viability of towns and municipalities across Nova Scotia. Overall principles were "municipalities must be viable into the long term; governance changes may be necessary to achieve viability and legislation and programs should support this; to create less confrontational ways to resolved service issues between municipalities; to make the tax burden on citizens for regional services fair; enhance support for the use of regional service delivery models and to provide new tools and incentives to increase economic growth in downtowns. Issues facing towns range from tax bases to declining population and infrastructure." I encourage you to read the report on line.


