TOWN OF NEW GLASGOW AND COUNTY OF PICTOU ANNOUNCE MAJOR PARTNERSHIP TO SUPPORT GROWTH OF THE REGION

The Town of New Glasgow and the Municipality of the County of Pictou have announced a partnership of monumental significance that will support the common vision and goals of both units to see Pictou County's economy grow through strong cooperation and set the stage for an ongoing partnership between Pictou

County's two largest municipalities.

New Glasgow Mayor Barrie MacMillan and Warden Ron Baillie made the announcement jointly at the public meeting with representatives of both Councils in attendance. The partnership encompasses a Master Water Agreement, an infrastructure investment and an intention to develop Exit 23 and Exit 25. A Master Water

new Glasgow's storm sewer separation strategy which is also an important action of environmental stewardship for the entire region.

The municipal partnership also includes a commercial development arrangement for Exit 23 and Exit 25 related to municipal services and ______ commercial tax shar-

ing.

"The impact of this arrangement is very significant for future economic growth throughout Pictou

County," says New Glasgow Mayor Barrie MacMillan. "The Town of New Glasgow and the County of Pictou combined represent 69% of the population base of Pictou County and 75% of the region's total tax assessment. Therefore, a

agreement for the sale of New Glasgow water to the Municipality of the County of Pictou was officially signed.

This will eliminate the multiple separate agreements that exist for various areas in the County. This agreement also provides capacity for future growth in areas in the County. Examples of the projects and areas affected by this agreement include the Pictou County Wellness Centre and the new correctional facility currently being built in the County.

The County of Pictou will invest \$500,000 into the Town of New Glasgow storm/sewer infrastructure on the west side of New Glasgow which will enable future growth in the county with servicing abilities as well as supporting partnership of this magnitude will enable us to make great progress and generate economic development through enhanced municipal cooperation.

As we all know water is one of the most important commodities, and we are proud that New Glasgow's water continues to exceed both provincial and Canadian drinking water standards. The combination of our assets will enable our communities and the region to benefit from more commercial and residential growth opportunities. WESTSIDE COMMUNITY CENTRE UPDATE

Work on the Westside Community Centre has begun with local contractor rooms; Minor renovations to canteen; Higgins Construction of Trenton on the project. Town Engineer Earl Mac-Kenzie says the project will improve the functional use of the existing building. "Upgrades are intended to meet today's codes for energy, accessibility, and electrical, as well as improve the aesthetics of the building," says MacKenzie.

The scope of work is planned to include the following but some adjustments may have to be made to assure the project is completed on budget: New pitched roof; New covered porch; New accessible washroom; Upgrade insulation to meet current code; Electrical upgrade to meet code; Modifications to forced air heating

system; Upgrades to existing wash-New exterior windows; New exterior cladding; New flooring (possible section of rubber flooring if funds allow); Sound reduction improvements; Renovations to existing storage areas; New entrance foyer; New ceiling and wall finishes; and Energy efficient fixtures and lighting.

Geralyn MacDonald, New Glasgow's **Director of Community Economic** Development says there is excitement in the community about the improvements and that the facility is always put to great use throughout all seasons.

"We look forward to seeing lots of activity at the Westside Community Centre this winter and appreciate all that the volunteers do for the facility. It is a great partnership and provides important opportunities for healthy lifestyle and recreation opportunities for our citizens."

The improvements to the Westside Community Centre facility are expected to be completed by end of January 2013 as weather conditions permit. The budget for the improvements totals \$230,000. The Town of New Glasgow is contributing \$115,000; \$60,000 is being contributed from the Westside Community Centre Board over 10 years; and \$55,000 is being contributed from the

HOLIDAY SAFETY TIPS FROM NEW GLASGOW REGIONAL POLICE SERVICE

With the holidays fast approaching the New Glasgow Regional Police Service would like everyone to have a safe holiday.

During this time of year thousands of residents of Pictou County and Nova Scotia travel near and far to visit friends and family. Take the time to plan your travel by making sure your vehicle is in working order for the unexpected weather and road condition by using 511 Road Condition Report. Remember our goal as a policing agency is zero for any injuries or deaths on our roadways.

It is a time for people to be with their families and friends, often leaving their homes unattended for days at a time. It is very important that certain steps be taken before people leave their home each day for work or on vacation. Make sure that you always leave your home looking like it is lived in. Have your driveways shovelled, your sidewalks kept clear and your mail picked up each day. It is also very important that you have a reliable friend or family member check your house regularly. Steps can be taken also to "target harden" your house. Lights that are on timers, as well as alarm systems can help protect your residence. Keep your windows locked and ensure that properly working door locks are in place. Each year people also leave messages on their answering machine that they will be away on holidays. This is an open invitation for a burglar. Tailor messages accordingly.

Other steps can also be taken to protect your house. Have a friend check your home at different times of the day and also place a TV or radio on a timer so that people will see the TV on or if they come to the door they can hear music playing.

During the holidays sometimes people leave their vehicles unlocked while Christmas shopping. A few steps should be taken to protect your vehicle from theft or the contents inside it. Take the time to place your Christmas items in a locked trunk and never leave the doors unlocked. Each year automobiles are stolen during the Christmas season with 30% of them never being recovered. If you lose your credit cards or cards with personal information on them immediately report the loss to the



credit card companies. One of the fastest growing thefts that we have in Canada is Identity Theft. It is very important to protect you identity and not give out your Social Insurance Number, your date of birth, and driver's license numbers that could be used by people who make up fraudulent credit cards and a false identity in your name.

The New Glasgow Regional Police Service would like everyone to take a stand in Crime Prevention. By working together we can reduce break-ins and thefts and make it safer for everyone during this holiday season. WELLNESS CENTRE CAMPAIGN SURPASSES \$7.6 MILLION GOAL

The Pictou County Wellness Centre announced on December 16th that it is giving Pictonians more than \$7.6 million reasons to smile - they're giving them \$7.75 million reasons.

"Tonight, we're going to talk about meeting significant achievements. Tonight, on behalf of the campaign cabinet, we are proud to share with you, our valued donors, that through your generosity, we've been able to stretch once again," said Co-Chair Murray Hill. "Tonight, we are so proud to announce that we have successfully raised a phenomenal \$7.75 million."

\$7 million of those funds goes towards the commitment to the original capital project and \$750,000 has gone to enhance the complex in both features as well as energy saving equipment.

"It's with no small measure of pride that we're able to reiterate that this phenomena complex was delivered on time, and on budget. By being on budget, we've been able to add some enhancements to make it more enjoyable to be in but also to make it one of the most energy efficient complexes of its type in Canada," said Dr. John Hamm. Constructing this to meet building codes would provide an energy rating of 100; the building we're in is actually rated at 160. That means less ongoing expense for our municipalities."

"Every pledge, every donation, every bit of support has allowed us to share this wonderful news in celebration with you all here this evening, within a couple of weeks of the building opened its doors," continued Hill. "This project is more



than a fundraising effort; it is an investment in Pictou County. The fundraising team will remain focused on pledge follow-up and celebrating and appropriately recognizing our generous donors. Echoing his Co-Chair's comments on generosity Dr. Hamm remarked, "You've stepped up from all corners of the county, pledging your support for making this building go from vision, to reality."

Dr. Hamm also reflected on the generous contributions from Sobeys and Empire Companies, "An early signal of leadership came from Sobeys and Empire Companies who provided \$3.4 million in land and in-kind services. This gift and this support was the foundation upon which this campaign and project was built, and it created the momentum we needed."

The \$38 facility was also made possible with \$11 million contributions from the federal and provincial governments, along with \$9 million from the municipal governments. "Today's generations have achieved a great legacy for Pictou County for years to come."

The Pictou County Wellness Centre Building Authority Inc. along with the campaign also recognized Project Manager Joe Fiander, Sobeys, and Lead Engineer Aaron Bryant, Crombie for their significant contributions and efforts in the project.

"The expertise of these two individuals has been invaluable and particularly showed when the building opened ontime and on-budget," said Hill. The authority and the cabinet also recognized Communications and Fundraising Manager Nicole LeBlanc, and both co-chairs.

The evening continued with a Celebrating Pictou County Gala, which supported the United Way of Pictou County, the Pictou County Fuel Fund and the two local food banks. "This grand open weekend has been about celebrating our community for this tremendous achievement which will impact the lives of today's Pictonians and those to come. The Government of Canada has contributed \$11 million towards this \$35.6-million project under the Major Infrastructure Component of the Building Canada Fund. The Province of Nova Scotia also provided \$11 million to the project. The six municipalities within Pictou County have contributed \$9 million to the new facility and the community fundraising was responsible for the remaining project costs.

PUBLIC INPUT SESSIONS PLANNED FOR NEW GLASGOW COMMUNITY ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT PLAN

In 2010 the New Glasgow Town Council approved the first New Glasgow Community Economic Development Plan. This three-five year plan was developed through public consultations and community input. The Town's Department of Community Economic Development led the sessions which provided a vision for community economic development, addressed opportunities and provided a work plan. Guiding principles in the process of community development planning are: advocacy, access and equity, capacity building, community participation and inclusion, information sharing and innovation.

In January/February 2013 the Town of New Glasgow will host community public sessions to update the plan which will include:

Recreation Facilities, Programs and Services, opportunities for the John Brother MacDonald Stadium, Glasgow Square and Riverfront Marina as well as Community Economic Development initiatives and projects.

The Town of New Glasgow will facilitate sessions to clarify and build on what the people of this community want for their future, and update the plan to achieve that vision. The plan will reflect expectations of our community and ensure the vision and goals are based on local needs, opportunities and capabilities. Our goal is to create a sustainable economy. This community-based approach emphasizes the town's and the region's unique assets, harnesses local expertise, and empowers the Town of New Glasgow to set plans and priorities in the best interest of the community.

The Community Economic Development Plan is about enhancing our community, setting goals and achieving outcomes through consultation, collaboration and partnerships. Community development planning and implementation lead to improved coordination of services and facilities.

PUBLIC WORKS UPDATE - CAPITAL PROJECTS UNDERWAY

Crews are currently installing sidewalk on Reservoir Street and previously did the sidewalk on Westville Road while a contractor replaced one side of the George Street Bridge sidewalk.

The New Glasgow Water Utility is currently working on a waterline on Ghana Avenue.

A contractor is also doing a water main replacement on North Avenue. An extension of services on Ellis Street has just gone out for tender and paving was done on several streets this year.

Some examples include East River Road and Stellarton Road, as well as Donald Street, Clyde Street, Blair Street, Athletic Street, North Street, and parts of Cameron Avenue, Elm Street, Terrace Street, Arch Street, Cottage Street, Fraser Street, and the George Street Bridge.

Warden Ron Baillie stated, "The potential for development from this agreement and partnership is very exciting and there is much promise for more to come. ties, we have just taken a major step forward for the entire region. This agreement has taken a lot of hard work and we are proud to tell our wider community of the great progress that has made. Pictou County is truly moving forward together."
